

## Five Funeral Plans

<p><b>All plans include:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Daytime removal of the remains from a hospital, convalescent home or other location.</li> <li>• Refrigeration of the body for at least two days</li> <li>• Transport to the place of burial or cremation</li> <li>• Assistance in making claims for Social Security death benefits or veteran services</li> </ul>	<p><b>Plans do NOT include:</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Death certificates, taxes, government permits and fees</li> <li>• Cemetery plots</li> <li>• Vaults or grave liners</li> <li>• Opening and closing graves</li> <li>• Grave markers</li> </ul>

### Two Cremation Plans

<p><b>Type C1—Direct Cremation.</b> This is the simplest disposition. A memorial service or other ceremony may be arranged separately, if desired.</p> <p>Included in the prices quoted are:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• a container for cremation;</li> <li>• the cost of cremation;</li> <li>• providing the cremated remains in a basic container for pickup by next of kin or other responsible party.</li> </ul> <p>Shipping or delivering ashes elsewhere will be <b>extra cost</b>.</p>	<p><b>Type C2—Direct Cremation, plus Scattering Ashes at Sea.</b></p> <p>This includes the same as Type C1 plus scattering the ashes, often with the ashes of others, by unscheduled plane or boat, 500 yards or more from the California coast.</p> <p>At <b>extra cost</b>, you can schedule the trip for your ashes only, have members of the family accompany the ashes, or combine the scattering of ashes with a memorial service.</p>

**Disposition of Cremated Remains:**  
Legally in California, you may keep the ashes at a place of residence, bury them in a consecrated cemetery, scatter them in a designated area of a cemetery, place them in a niche in a columbarium (a building on cemetery grounds built to inter ashes), or bury or scatter ashes on private land with permission of the owner.

### Three Burial Plans

<p><b>Type B1—Direct Burial.</b> This is the next simplest disposition. A memorial service or other ceremony must be arranged separately, if one is desired.</p> <p>Included in the quoted prices:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• minimum required professional services;</li> <li>• the simplest casket;</li> <li>• The price <b>does not include</b> the cost of embalming.</li> </ul>	<p><b>Type B2—Graveside Service.</b> A ceremony held at the graveside or at the crematory, in the presence of the body. In addition, a separate memorial service may be arranged elsewhere at any later date.</p> <p>Included in the quoted price:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• the simplest casket;</li> <li>• necessary professional services;</li> <li>• transport to the cemetery for a scheduled graveside ceremony and burial (or to the crematory for a ceremony there);</li> </ul> <p>Please note that the price quoted <b>does not cover</b> any visitation or viewing, use of the mortuary chapel, coach transport, or cortege to the cemetery.</p>

## ***Five Funeral Plans***

### ***Type B3—Full Service Funeral.***

Includes:

- a simple casket;
- embalming or refrigeration,
- dressing, cosmetic, and related professional services;
- receipt and handling of flowers at the mortuary chapel;
- two hours of visitation/viewing at the mortuary;
- use of the mortuary chapel for a ceremony with ushers;
- after the ceremony a scheduled transport in a funeral coach to a local cemetery for a graveside committal;
- a memorial register, memorial folders, acknowledgment cards;
- counseling
